Arachim Speakers & Presenters - brief bios

Nic Abery is the Director of LooktoLearn; an integrated education company. With over 20 years of experience in education, she combines Religious themes and secular education through the exploration of museum art, objects and culture. Her expertise and innovative teaching style has taken her throughout the UK, Europe and Israel.

Alastair Falk is an education consultant based in the UK. He has formerly worked as a Principal of three schools, Director if the Academy of Enterprise, and Director of the UK's Jewish school strategy organisation, Pajes. He is currently Director of Partnerships for the Birmingham Education Partnership, an organization offering support to some 400 schools. He has been involved with Arachim for a number of years and has been responsible for putting together this year's programme.

Shiri Daniels, Ph.D., National Director of Counseling - Israel Trauma Coalition / Eran

Dr. Daniels is leading ERAN's professional and methodological aspects including: volunteer recruitment and training procedures, support and intervention methodology, external training programs, developing and managing collaboration with government and public institutions, academic institutions, support organizations and corporations. Dr. Daniels has 15 years of experience in individual and group counseling, prevention of risk behavior in adolescents, devising programs for intervention in emergencies and organizational counseling.

Marcell Kenesei learned he was Jewish when his parents brought him, age 13, to the Lauder Foundation school in Budapest. Since then he's been a counselor at Jewish summer camps, volunteer educator at the Haver Jewish Informal Public Beneft Foundation, and he is also a graduate of Paideia. He joined the team of Centropa in June 2011. At Centropa Marcell is running its educational programs in Hungary, in Israel, and he is also the director of CJN, the Centropa Jewish Network for European Jewish Schools.

Helena Miller is the Director of Research and Evaluation and Director of Community Israel Engagement at UJIA. She oversaw the inspection of Jewish schools in the UK from 2004-2014. Helena has a doctorate in Jewish Education and has taught and written widely for many years. She has been involved in creating and supporting many Jewish education initiatives in the UK and overseas, notably JCoSS – the first cross communal Jewish secondary school in the UK. Helena is the 2012 recipient of the Max Fisher Prize for outstanding contribution to Jewish education in the Diaspora. She is the Senior Editor of the Journal of Jewish Education, and she is a fellow of the Centre for Jewish peoplehood.

Sandra Anusiewicz-Baer studied education, Jewish studies and Islamic studies in Berlin and Haifa as well as cultural management in Hamburg. The former head of the educational department and director of the cultural department of the Jewish community of Berlin was founder and editor of the first Jewish parent magazine "Familienmentsch". She researched the importance and longtime impact of a Jewish education on the self-definition and major life choices of alumni of the Jewish High School in Berlin. Currently, Sandra is working as the coordinator of the conservative/Masorti Rabbinical Seminary in Berlin, the Zacharias Frankel College.

Rabbi David Levin Kruss is the Director of Jewish Education for Europe for the JDC. Previously, he was on the faculty of the Pardes Institute in Jerusalem. He also worked as overseas director for Melitz and community director of Stanmore Synagogue in London. He holds a B.A. in English Literature and Jewish Thought from Hebrew University, rabbinic ordination from Straus Rabbinical Seminary, Ohr Torah, and studied life coaching at the Jerusalem Coaching Institute.

Martti Hellstrom is 62 years old doctor of Education (PhD 2004) and ex-principal from Aurora Elementary School at Espoo, one of the most acclaimed schools in Finland with worldwide recognition. Martti has worked as a trainer of new classroom teachers since 1982 and trainer of new principals since 1991. He has written several schoolbooks for Finnish elementary school teachers.

At the moment, Martti is a lecturer of the curriculum reform (2016) and a facilitator in Finland in an international reform project called New Pedagogics for Deep Learning led by doctor Michael Fullan

Karen Ettinger leads European educational projects of the National Library of Israel dedicated to promoting use of primary sources in education. Born in Birmingham, Karen made Aliyah at the age of 11. She has an MA in Learning Technologies and vast experience in the field of online education.

Rabbi Debbie Young-Somers is the Community Educator at The Movement for Reform Judaism and enjoys seeing the breadth and depth of Reform Jewish life in the UK in her work. She graduated from Leo Baeck College in 2009 and spent 4 years as part of the rabbinic team at West London Synagogue. She is also a graduate of Paideia, The European Institute for Jewish Studies in Stockholm, and of Lancaster University, and is currently studying the craft of storytelling! She teaches both student rabbis and trainee Christian clergy about dialogue and encounter. A regular broadcaster and writer, she is passionate about helping you find what will bring you the most joy, meaning and comfort in your Judaism. She runs a monthly toddler service from her home in Borehamwood, and is an active volunteer in the interfaith world and Limmud. She has a particular passion for issues around the environment, mikveh use, personal ritual and Jewish crafting
